Backus school defamation suit can go forward

State Court of Appeals overturned dismissal of case

BACKUS - In 2024, former Foothills Christian Academy student

Rebecca-Kay Hamson and family saw a district court dismiss their defamation lawsuit against former Principal and Pastor Blair Ecker.

On Oct. 20, The Minnesota Court of Appeals reversed the dismissal. allowing the suit to continue.

Hamson alleges that

Ecker held a meeting to investigate a cheating and grade-changing incident at the school in 2022, where students at the school manipulated

grades via access to the computer grade system.

According to documents from the court case, in the process of questioning other students, Ecker allegedly made defamatory statements about Hamson, referring to her as

the ring leader of the plan and being "somebody with poor IQ" and "a spe-

cial ed." Ecker also allegedly claimed Hamson had been expelled.
